## **What is Per Capita?**

Per capita (Latin for “by head / person”) is how Presbyterians share equally, responsibly, and interdependently in the costs of governing the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Per capita is:

- The major source of funding for the Presbytery;
- Requested from every congregation;
- Based on total active membership of each church;
- Paid by the Presbytery to the Synod of Lincoln Trails and General Assembly each year.

## **What Does Per Capita Provide?**

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is a connectional church. Presbyterian congregations worship, serve, and govern together. Per capita contributions fund the shared governing responsibilities for the whole church. Together with the per capita contributions from churches throughout the country, they support the governance work of three councils of our church - presbyteries, synods, and the General Assembly.

Presbyterian ministers and elected ruling elders serve as representatives to these three councils. Commissioners to each council represent their individual churches, or council, but their main purpose is to prayerfully and obediently seek to discern the will of Jesus Christ together. Per capita contributions support ministries such as:

- The work of Presbytery of Chicago’s Commission on Ministry and Commission on Preparation for Ministry;
- The work of our staff and various committees;
- Official meetings of the councils / assemblies of the Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly.

## **How Do We Calculate Each Church’s Share of Per Capita?**

The Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly each set per capita based on their annual budgets and the number of active members in the churches of each organization.

It is important for churches to accurately report their membership annually. Each church’s share of per capita is calculated with the membership figures reported by the Session and recorded in the most recent General Assembly Minutes.

- The rate for 2024 is based on the total number of active members reported at the end of 2022.
- Each church is encouraged to give its full requested share of per capita, regardless of how it collects these funds from among church members.

## **Per Capita Helps Churches**

Through per capita, the Presbytery of Chicago is able to:

- Help congregations with pastoral transitions
- Train and support interim / transitional ministers
- Resolve congregational conflicts
- Care for ministers, Christian Educators, and their families
- Help prepare people for service as ordained ministers
- Organize and run presbytery assembly meetings
- Provide staff to support congregations
